Lauren was selected to receive this award for her ongoing contributions to the field of human development and planned dissertation research on the long-term effects of recovery high school attendance on substance use disorder recovery outcomes and the mechanisms underlying them.

Vital Villages, a program that brings wrap around care directly to families' homes, was awarded a three year \$115,000 grant from the Yarg Foundation! Services begin January of 2024 in Cottage Grove, Oregon.
